MARCH 14, 2022

MINUTES

The meeting was called to order by Jack; Pastor Sheri opened with a devotion and an opening prayer.

Last month's Meeting Minutes were read. Motion made to approve by Marshall, and seconded by Lee. Motion carried.

TREASURER'S REPORT

Marshall shared financial reports as of February 28, 2022. All bills are paid to date.

FINANCE REPORT

There was discussion regarding tithing and how to increase our income. Shirley suggested fundraisers. Pastor encouraged all to invite people to come to church. Connecting with others and building friendships and relationships will help people want to know more and possibly join in. When we invite, we can offer to meet them at church or bring them with us.

TRUSTEE REPORT

Lee reported on several items:

1. Habo's brother will update the rest of the rooms with LED lights.
2. Wendy Hoppe will replace the bathroom fixtures and drains. She'll also fix the small urinal in the men's room. Cost for this project is \$600-\$800.
3. Lee is working on repairing the door handles on the outside doors with lever-type handles for easier opening.
4. Heritage Fund rolled over for another 18 months.
5. The Music Media Fund has been inactive; Lee made a deposit to avoid service charges.
6. A crib was donated for the nursery off the sanctuary. The old crib, changing table, and rocker were given away to people in need. We'll make more/better use of the Sunday School classrooms upstairs.

EDUCATION COMMITTEE REPORT

Pastor shared that this year's VBS program will be on Cokesbury's Food Truck Party. Dates/times have not yet been set. Pastor asked Cheryl how much has been tithed toward VBS as there have been regular weekly donations. There was only a total available in the Education fund; Cheryl will be asked to maintain a running total of weekly VBS donations.

The Lenten Study continues on Tuesdays at 10am, weekly through the end of March.

Children's and Youth Sunday School continues as is the Youth Handbell Choir.

WORSHIP REPORT

Pastor shared that the youth will perform a play during the Palm Sunday Service. We will hold Maundy Thursday Service at 5:30pm in Fellowship Hall with a meal and service.

A Good Friday Service will be held at North Judson UMC, all are invited to attend (time to be determined).



My Grief Letter.

It's wonderful living in a small community like Toulon where everybody knows me, but it's very hard right now. Even though I have people around me, it's not the same thing. I constantly think about how alone I am even though I feel the Lord's presence within me.

Psalm 34:18 "The Lord is close to the brokenhearted and saves those who are crushed in spirit."

There are 5 things I want to share with those who wish to comfort me.

1. Please feel free to talk about Barbara when you are around me. Don't feel awkward remarking about something that happened or you saw something that reminded you of her. It's very possible I thought the same thing.
2. Ignoring my grief does not make it go away.
3. Don't make comments about next year being better or time healing all wounds; my concerns are focused on the here and now.
4. Let me cry if I need to. You don't have to say anything - just hand me some tissues and be there for me. It's ok for a man to cry.
5. Please don't make judgments about how long it's taking me to grieve.

My prayer is that this letter will make it easier for all of us who are grieving our loss.

Social Principles: The World Community



United Methodists across the globe are condemning the Russian invasion of Ukraine. As Christians “we believe war is incompatible with the teachings and example of Christ. We therefore reject war as an instrument of national foreign policy.” (2016 Book of Discipline, Social Principles ¶165.C). We also know our God stands with the oppressed and calls on us to support them. See some of the ways United Methodist leaders, organizations and individuals are responding to the invasion of Ukraine through their prayer, aid and witness.

God's world is one world. The unity now being thrust upon us by technological revolution has far outrun our moral and spiritual capacity to achieve a stable world. The enforced unity of humanity, increasingly evident on all levels of life, presents the Church as well as all people with problems that will not wait for answer: injustice, war, exploitation, privilege, population, international ecological crisis, proliferation of arsenals of nuclear weapons, development of transnational business organizations that operate beyond the effective control of any governmental structure, and the increase of tyranny in all its forms. This generation must find viable answers to these and related questions if humanity is to continue on this earth. We commit ourselves as a Church to the achievement of a world community that is a fellowship of persons who honestly love one another. We pledge ourselves to seek the meaning of the gospel in all issues that divide people and threaten the growth of world community.

Nations and Cultures

As individuals are affirmed by God in their diversity, so are nations and cultures. We recognize that no nation or culture is absolutely just and right in its treatment of its own people, nor is any nation totally without regard for the welfare of its citizens. The Church must regard nations as accountable for unjust treatment of their citizens and others living within their borders. While recognizing valid differences in culture and political philosophy, we stand for justice and peace in every nation.

National Power and Responsibility

Some nations possess more military and economic power than do others. Upon the powerful rests responsibility to exercise their wealth and influence with restraint. We will promote restorative justice strategies to support positive social change and peace building. We affirm the right and duty of people of all nations to determine their own destiny. We urge the major political powers to use their nonviolent power to maximize the political, social, and economic self-determination of other nations rather than to further their own special interests. We applaud international efforts to develop a more just international economic order in which the limited resources of the earth will be used to the maximum benefit of all nations and peoples. We urge Christians in every society to encourage the governments under which they live and the economic entities within their societies to aid and work for the development of more just economic orders.

War and Peace

We believe war is incompatible with the teachings and example of Christ. We therefore reject war as an instrument of national foreign policy. We oppose unilateral first/preemptive strike actions and strategies on the part of any government. As disciples of Christ, we are called to love our enemies, seek justice, and serve as reconcilers of conflict. We insist that the first moral duty of all nations is to work together to resolve by peaceful means every dispute that arises between or among them. We advocate the extension and strengthening of international treaties and institutions that provide a framework within the rule of law for responding to aggression, terrorism, and genocide. We believe that human values must outweigh military claims as governments determine their priorities; that the militarization of society must be challenged and stopped; that the manufacture, sale, and deployment of armaments must be reduced and controlled; and that the production, possession, or use of nuclear weapons be condemned. Consequently, we endorse general and complete disarmament under strict and effective international control.

Justice and Law

Persons and groups must feel secure in their life and right to live within a society if order is to be achieved and maintained by law. We denounce as immoral an ordering of life that perpetuates injustice and impedes the pursuit of peace. Peoples and nations feel secure in the world community when law, order, and human rights are respected and upheld.

Believing that international justice requires the participation of all peoples and nations, we endorse the United Nations, its related bodies, the International Court of Justice and the International Criminal Court as the best instruments now in existence to achieve a world of justice and law. We commend the efforts of all people in all countries who pursue world peace through law. We endorse international aid and cooperation on all matters of need and conflict. We urge acceptance for membership in the United Nations of all nations who wish such membership and who accept United Nations responsibility. We urge the United Nations to take a more aggressive role in the development of international arbitration of disputes and actual conflicts among nations by developing binding third-party arbitration. Bilateral or multilateral efforts outside of the United Nations should work in concert with, and not contrary to, its purposes. We reaffirm our historic concern for the world as our parish and seek for all persons and peoples full and equal membership in a truly world community.

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Resilience Seminar

Resilience is "the ability to withstand, adapt, recover and/or grow in the face of challenges and demands."



THE STORY OF EASTER

(As told in the Gospels Matthew, Mark, Luke, & John)

When it was evening, there came a rich man from Arimathea, named **Joseph**, who was also a disciple of Jesus. He went to **Pilate** and asked for the body of **Jesus**; then Pilate ordered it to be given to him. So Joseph took the **body** and wrapped it in a clean **linen** cloth and laid it in his own new **tomb**, which he had hewn in the **rock**. He then rolled a great **stone** to the door of the tomb and went away. **Mary Magdalene** and the other Mary were there, sitting opposite the tomb.

The next day, that is, after the day of Preparation, the chief priests and the Pharisees gathered before Pilate and said, "Sir, we remember what that impostor said while he was still **alive**, 'After three days I will **rise** again.' Therefore command the tomb to be made **secure** until the **third day**; otherwise his disciples may go and **steal** him away, and tell the people, 'He has been **raised** from the **dead**,' and the last deception would be worse than the first." Pilate said to them, "You have a guard of **soldiers**; go, make it as secure as you can." So they went with the **guard** and made the tomb secure by **sealing** the stone.

When the **sabbath** was over, Mary Magdalene, and Mary the mother of James, and Salome bought **spices**, so that they might go and **anoint** him. And very early on the **first**

day of the week, when the sun had risen, they went to the tomb. They had been saying to one another, "Who will **roll away** the stone for us from the entrance to the tomb?"

And suddenly there was a great **earthquake**; for an **angel** of the Lord, descending from **heaven**, came and rolled back the stone and sat on it. His appearance was like **lightning**, and his clothing **white** as **snow**. For fear of him the guards shook and became like dead men. But the angel said to the **women**, "Do not be **afraid**; I know that you are looking for Jesus who was **crucified**. He is not here; for he has been raised, as he said. Come, see the place where he lay.

But go, tell his **disciples** and **Peter** that he is going ahead of you to **Galilee**; there you will see him, just as he told you." But Mary stood **weeping** outside the tomb. As she wept, she bent over to look into the tomb; and she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had been lying, one at the **head** and the other at the **feet**. They said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping?" She said to them, "They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him." When she had said this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing there, but she did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping? Whom are you looking for?" Supposing him to be the **gardener**, she said to him, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where you have laid him, and I will take him away." Jesus said to her, "Mary!" She turned and said to him in Hebrew, "**Rabbouni!**" (which means **Teacher**). Jesus said to her, "Do not hold on to me, because I have not yet **ascended** to the **Father**. But go to my brothers and say to them, 'I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God.'" Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, "I have **seen** the Lord"; and she told them that he had said these things to her. But these words seemed to them an **idle tale**, and they did not believe them. Then Peter and the other disciple (**John**) set out and went toward the tomb. The two were **running** together, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. He bent down to look in and saw the linen wrappings lying there, but he did not go in. Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb. He saw the linen wrappings lying there, and the cloth that had been on Jesus' head, not lying with the linen wrappings but rolled up in a place by itself. Then the other disciple, who reached the tomb first, also went in, and he saw and **believed**; for as yet they did not understand the **scripture**, that he must rise from the dead. Then the disciples returned to their homes.
